

A verb is a word in the predicate that tells physical or mental action or a state of being.

• There are three kinds of verbs:

Action verbs tell what the subject is doing.

Linking verbs link a subject to a noun or an adjective that names or describes it.

Helping verbs come before the main verb. Helping verbs help state the action or show time.

We **played** until it was dark. Everyone **laughed** at the funny movie.

Their dog **is** a Saint Bernard. The buttered popcorn **smells** delicious.

Arnold **will** paint the door tomorrow. He **has been** painting the frame today.

The verb in a sentence must agree in number with the subject.
If the subject is singular, the verb must be singular.

Iced **lemonade is** refreshing on a hot day.

If the subject is plural, the verb must be plural.

Apple pies are delicious with vanilla ice cream.
